

Session 2: "Called to Christ's Mission Today"

Recently I was read a book that asked the question: What would happen if we truly took Jesus' words seriously today? The whole book was an asking of that great question in the myriad and countless issues that are part of our post-modern landscape today. In the Gospel today, of course, the theme of gratitude applies. But, there's another theme present: How do we treat and how do we welcome those who we consider, and those who believe themselves, outcasts or outsiders? What is our mission regarding them as we think about Christ's mission today?

In the Gospel, Jesus tells these lepers, these outcasts, to show themselves to the priests. And, if the priests see they are leprosy free, then they will allow these former outcasts back into the community. That was huge. Probably, leprosy was marginally tolerable if you were able to remain part of the community. What made leprosy so awful and dreadful was the fact that because of it, you were ostracized from the community, living in some awful segregated part of the city.

How do we do the same as Jesus did for those who feel ostracized from our community, who feel like outcasts and outsiders? If we honestly claim that all are welcome, what does that mean?

This week in Arise, we read, "We see Jesus as the living expression of God's solidarity, reaching out in compassion to those who were on the margins of society (outcasts): to lepers, women, to foreigners. Luke shows us a Jesus who worked out the implications of His mission in His every 'today.' What are the implications of that same mission for us 'today?' Where are our blind-spots in our society and culture (Church), and how can we shed light on them? What are the forms of oppression, subtle and blatant, in our community?" Wow!! That should energize your small group conversation!! Have a great week!
